

what to do... *easy steps*

- Install compact fluorescent/fluorescent lightbulbs in guest rooms, lobbies, hallways
- Install low-flow showerheads, toilets, aerators; refillable hair/skin care dispensers
- Establish a guest towel and linen re-use program
- Add recycling bins to guest rooms, public areas, offices, kitchen
- Encourage guests to take open/partially used amenities and soaps with them; donate amenities, used furniture and appliances to a local organization

moderate steps

- Use cloth napkins, glass cups, and ceramic dishes instead of paper and plastic
- Order paper products with a high recycled content
- Install water- and energy-conserving laundry and restaurant equipment
- Replace water-cooled ice machines with air-cooled equipment
- Install timers and sensors for areas that are used infrequently

challenging steps

- Install keycard systems that automatically shut off air/heat/lights when guests leave
- Use heat generated from the air conditioning system to provide hot water for property and guest use
- Compost leftover foods; start a vegetable and herb garden to supply your restaurant
- Replace carpets with recycled wood flooring to decrease cleaning costs and time
- Activate a solid waste reduction program, which reduces waste-hauling fees too!

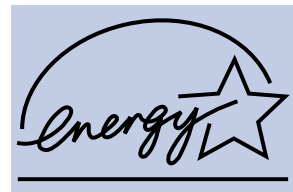

Founded in 1989, Green Seal is a non-profit organization that provides science-based environmental certification standards that are credible, transparent, and essential in an increasingly educated and competitive marketplace. It identifies and promotes products and services that cause less toxic pollution and waste, conserve resources and habitats, and minimize global warming and ozone-depletion. Green Seal was instrumental in the development of ecolabelling policy standards under the ISO 14000 environmental management series.

The Carpet and Rug Institute's Green Label Seal of Approval identifies vacuum cleaners evaluated by an independent testing laboratory. The Seal of Approval is granted to vacuum cleaners that meet the strict standards of its Green Label test program for the following: Dust Containment, Soil Removal, and Carpet Appearance. Serial numbers on the CRI Label identify these vacuums.

recycled content

The US Environmental Protection Agency's Procurement Guidelines (CPG) encourage the use of materials recovered through recycling with the goal to reduce the amount of disposed waste. The CPG designates items in the following product categories: Paper, Vehicular Construction, Transportation, Park and Recreation, Landscaping, Non-Paper and Office products.
